We would also encourage North Dorset District Council to adopt Active Design in the development of new housing schemes as well when considering regenerating areas or enhancing them.

Active Design

Active Design is about designing and adapting where we live to encourage activity in our everyday lives.

It's a combination of 10 principles that promote activity, health and stronger communities through the way we design and build our towns and cities.

That's why Sport England, in partnership with Public Health England, have produced the Active Design Guidance.

This guidance builds on the original objectives of improving accessibility, enhancing amenity and increasing awareness, and sets out the 10 principles of Active Design. Our guidance and further details can be found here:

Employment:

Traditional forms of employment have been changing in the last 100 years, unfortunately the perception of what employment land is has not. The introduction of B8 distribution challenged local authorities in the 80's and '90s as more of these uses came forward. Sport is often overlooked as an employer.

It is estimated that there is a total of 389 people employed via sport in North Dorset with an economic generation of £15.6m into the local economy. This is 189 more people than in the Financial and Insurance sector in North Dorset! There are wider values as well in saving £24.6m in the health economy and generating £2.4m m in wider spending with a further £6.4m in volunteering. (See attached file)

Therefore, Sport England would encourage a new thinking towards sports related employment activities in Employment areas, based on economic cases as outlined previously. This can in part be done by sequential test and the use of Sport England's Economic tool:

A good case study is the conversion of a B2 use in Sandwell (ref DC/16/59751) to a gymnastics club which created more jobs than the previous use.
