Executive Summary

In the construction of this Community Plan we have continually tried to look to the future and whilst we appreciate and acknowledge the importance of the history and traditions of the village it is the population of the here and now and of the future for whom we have to direct our efforts - so no pages and pages of history.

The large majority of the populace like the village as it is and do not want change!

Comments and criticisms revolve around small but vital issues to the community of safety, cleanliness and caretaking.

The Recommendations tell of what we intend to achieve for the community.

The remainder of the plan is purely substantiating evidence.

Introduction

At the November 2005 meeting of the Bryanston Parish Council Maria Young of the DCA gave a brief dissertation on the procedures and benefits of the preparation and publishing of a Parish Plan.

This was enough to galvanise the Council into inviting and approving the formation of a working group to realise this end and thus the Bryanston Community Plan was born.

A pre-planning meeting was held on 30^{th} November 2005 and the inaugural meeting of the working party occurred on 19^{th} December 2005.

The first full meeting was held on 28th February 2006 with regular meetings occurring approximately every two months.

On 3^{rd} March 2006 Simon Thompson, of the DCA, advised and assisted with the preparation of a grant application to fund the preparation of the plan. The application was submitted on 20^{th} March and approved on 28^{th} March 2006.

During June 2006 a Preliminary Questionnaire was circulated to some 160 residences in order to define areas that were of specific importance to Bryanston as the generic software produced by the University of Gloucester for 'village appraisals' was being used as the basis of a formal questionnaire.

Some 45 replies (28%) were received and analysed. As a thank you to the participants in this stage of the plan process random prizes of £50, £30 and £25 were awarded at an open evening held at the Estate Club which was attended by various members of the local community.

The Formal Questionnaire was developed and printed between July and September 2006 and in October delivered by a number of stalwart helpers to the community.

Together with a letter, a member of the Working Group personally delivered each household's copy of the BCP questionnaire. The cover of the document was also an entry into a raffle which was open to all who returned a completed questionnaire and the lucky residents won prizes to the value of £100, £50 and £25

The neighbour who delivered the questionnaire explained the importance to the community of returning as many completed documents as possible. The more information that we accumulated, the greater the chance we had of influencing local policies and obtaining funding to provide the additional services

that it was felt the community might require. At the time of the delivery of the questionnaire residents were asked if they would kindly agree a date and time when the completed document could be collected and, if they felt that they would benefit from some assistance with completing the document, a convenient time to meet was arranged.

The Formal Questionnaires were collected during December 2006 / January 2007 some 70 being returned out of 96 delivered (73%).

Between February and July 2007 the data from the questionnaires was tabulated and interpreted and a draft Bryanston Community Plan was presented to the July meeting of the Parish council for comment and approval.


Feedback from various interested parties was obtained between July 2007 and March 2008 and the Final Plan was published and circulated to all those involved in its compilation and all parish residents during April/May 2008.


Commentary

Amenities

Within the boundaries of the village we are fortunate to have two establishments which could provide the types of facilities found in a more traditional location - a village pub - meeting hall - playing fields and sports arenas.


And whilst many agree the importance of Bryanston School and the Estate Club within the life of the village little use is able to be made of their attributes.






The desire for closer links with the school is obvious from the weight of opinion wishing to have the ability to use their facilities.


Similarly at least 50% of the population would enjoy the ability to make use of the Estate Club amenities.



It would seem, therefore, appropriate to commence a dialogue with these two organisations to foster closer relationships within the community and to endeavour to negotiate the use of some of their facilities.

Strong support also exists for the introduction of a children's playground to the village, born out by the concern for the lack of local social facilities particularly for the section of the population below sixteen years of age.







The investigation of the provision of a children's playground must be seen as a priority.

Activities

Within this section the need exists to examine both the activities which residents would like to see available within the village and the methods by which those activities are advertised and communicated to everyone. The availability of volunteers to assist with the management of recreational events is also of crucial importance.






In terms of the more physical pursuits Keep Fit comes highest on the wish list with a high number of volunteers willing to participate with Tennis coming second.

Most other of the activities is currently provided by the Estate Club and could possibly be made available to a larger section of the community.

The opportunity to play Tennis should be linked to any dialogue with Bryanston School and similarly Keep Fit with the Estate Club.

The more cultural activities had similar results





Perhaps a group could be formed to evaluate and progress the provision of some of these activities.

More than 50% of the population consider that the information available about forthcoming events is poor and it must therefore be essential to improve village communications.

At present the majority of people consider that they obtain information via the Blackmore Vale newspaper - this is considered surprising as few village events are advertised this way. The second most popular method of communication would seem to be notice boards - again surprising as these are infrequently used and 42% of people do not even know of the existing notice boards.


However 51% answered that a village newsletter was required and 61% requested that a Residents Association newsletter be delivered to every home.


This would seem to be the route to take with copies of the newsletter being additionally posted on the village notice boards and being available on the Parish Council web site, the existence of which should also be notified to every household. New and better quality notice boards should also be a priority.

Traffic

If one topic causes more discussion and concern at both resident and Parish Council levels it is the effect of traffic on the village.

When looking at any particular element of traffic concern, speeding always comes out top.






Other concerns involve lorry traffic although this may have been exacerbated during the period of the questionnaire by the excessive amount of lorry movements serving the building of the new science block at Bryanston School.

On road parking is also a problem experienced in two areas of the village. At the bottom of New Road where vehicles are often left by non-residents going into Blandford town centre and on The Cliff where there is a particular lack of off road parking available.






These problem areas may be alleviated by resident's only parking in New Road and adaptation of the 'triangle' area on the Cliff although this will require the permission of Bryanston School who own this section of land.


Over 82% of residents believe that there is specific traffic 'danger spots' within the village area, New Road being the location of primary concern. And these 'danger spots' have a significant relationship to traffic speed. *An extension of the areas of the existing speed limits would seem appropriate*.

Other areas given particular mention were the junction between The Cliff and New Road and the Bryanston School roundabout and these areas should be the subject of further investigation.

Transport

The answers to all of the questions relating to public transport or to the ability of residents to be able to access shopping, social services etc. indicated that the village's lack of transport did not pose a problem.





However it is important to note that although a small percentage a bus service is some residents only method of travelling out of the village. We must therefore try to ensure that some form of bus service, preferably improved, is retained. At present only 2 buses serve any part of the village and then it is only a maximum of one service a day (316 Thursday only, 834 Monday to Friday term time only). The residents using buses might be better served by the dial a ride Nordcat bus service if this were better advertised

The Built Environment

Street Lighting


Whilst 48 % consider the street lighting poor only 19% would like to see more lighting confirmation that the lack of background light pollution still remains one of the attractions of Bryanston.

Housing

An overwhelming 90% of residents do not think that the area can accommodate any more housing and object to the principle of further development.

Services

Most residents feel that the performance provided by the emergency services is of a high quality with the exception of the local beat or community police officers, whose existence is not known of by a large number of people



This is probably why a large number would welcome and join a neighbourhood watch scheme.

Safety


Generally people feel safe in Bryanston with concern being shown at night time for crimes involving theft, vandalism and drunkenness. It is considered that the situation could be improved through a neighbourhood watch scheme and more education and activities for younger people, items that are addressed elsewhere in the plan.


Roads

Most consider the conditions of the roads, verges and hedges around the village to be at the very least reasonable.

Recycling

85% would keep items separate if specific recycling collections were made with the number also willing to use local facilities.





However it is agreed that the local facilities are not adequately advertised.

More litter bins would also be welcomed throughout the community.

Shops

The demography of the population, the geography of the village and the relative closeness of shopping alternatives emphasise why only 50% of residents would use local facilities only at a maximum once a week and only 25% would use mobile services.

Telephone Box


Whilst some 83% of residents never use the telephone box on the Cliff 6 people recorded that they used it often. It may be their only lifeline and therefore important that we protect its existence.


Future Development

The Natural Environment

Over 50% of residents agree that the environment of Bryanston is the most important feature of living in the community with 90% of them confirming that the countryside is its most significant attribute.







However, unfortunately, whilst most welcome the tranquillity that the countryside brings an appreciable number consider that it has changed for the worse in the last few years and thus together with this the quality of life.

To help alleviate this over 53% of residents would be willing to take part in village 'Spring Clean Days' and many would welcome the introduction of 'dog mess' bins in Lower Bryanston and close to the Estate Club.

People consider the ongoing husbandry of the woodlands and the regular maintenance of hedges to be the priority in managing and improving the natural environment of the community.


Whilst over 60% know the location of footpaths/ bridle ways etc 72% of residents feel that they would like maps of these






Other Elements

The village has a very even split between the sexes with an age range primarily between 18 and 64 indicating that most of the population are working and out of the village on a daily basis. This most probably accounts for any apparent lack of concern with respect to many aspects of village life
