Age:

With 28.6% of Dorset's population over 65 years of age, we have a considerably higher population of older people than England and Wales at 18.2%. 55.4% of our population are of working age and 15.9% are aged 15 or below.

Disability:

Disability is defined as a physical or mental impairment that has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on the ability to carry out normal day to day activities. Across the Dorset Council area 8% of the population has day to day activities that are limited a lot and 11% have day to day limited activities a little (*Source: Census 2011, ONS*).

Ethnicity:

The current population statistics for the Dorset Council area indicate that the population is predominantly White British (95.6%). However, the overall statistic for Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) of 4.4% with 1.7% of the population not having English as their mother tongue. However it is unclear whether this is representative of the entire Dorset area and how much regional variation there is in certain parts of the Dorset area.

98.3% of Dorset's residents aged 3 and over have recorded English as their main language in the 2011 Census. This contrasts with a figure of 92% for England and Wales. Over 6,000 Dorset residents, English is not their first language. Where English is not the main language spoken 78 other languages feature across the County as resident's main

language, some in very small numbers. Where English is not the main language spoken, Polish is recorded with the next highest number 1,457 in Dorset, followed by German 429, all other Chinese 344 and Nepalese 292.

Religion:

25.4% of Dorset residents identify as having no religion and 65.1% of residents are Christian. The five major non-Christian world religions Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, Judaism and Sikhism constitute 1.5% of Dorset's residents' religious beliefs. These groups are concentrated in Dorset's towns e.g. Weymouth has just over 300 residents of Muslim faith. There are small areas of the county with relatively high proportions of people from minority religions. Tarrant Launceston and Tarrant Monkton for example have 7% and 4% of the population who are Hindu and 3% and 2% who are Buddhist. This reflects the significant Ghurkha community based in and around Blandford Camp.

Deprivation and accessibility

What engagement or consultation has taken place as part of this EqIA?

Consultation took place between 21 June 2019 and Friday 2 August 2019. All consultees that were on the previous planning policy databases from the former district areas were contacted as well as general and specific consultees. The consultation asked if people agreed or disagreed with the statement and why and what changes would make it agreeable. People were able to respond via hard copy forms or online via a snap survey. 165 people responded.

Please provide details:	<p>All ages should be able to give opinions as planning can affect everyone.</p> <p>The SCI states that we will use online and hard copy methods for communicating. For instance, to communicate with those who use internet, we need to provide online access to material in an easy to use format. We should also publicise this via social media. To communicate effectively with the under 15's we should ensure that we engage with school age children by making use of school newsletters or events for strategic matters.</p> <p>The SCI also states that all communication will be written in plain English.</p> <p>For those without access to the internet or without the skills to access the internet we will advertise the use of Digital Champions.</p> <p>To communicate effectively we should make use of both hard and soft copies of our material. As we are trying to move towards a paperless system which is better for the environment, we can provide hard copies upon request.</p> <p>Due to the methods proposed for engaging with the public and stakeholders, it is unlikely that any particular age group will be omitted from responding.</p>
