


Recycling is good, but **Reusing** is better and **Reducing** is best

Slim your rubbish bin

Creating less waste saves money for your household and local council







Textiles

If still in good usable condition, donate to a charity shop for reuse or hold a fun "Swishing party" swapping clothes with friends. All clean bagged textiles, clothing, shoes, belts and bags can be taken to local recycling banks and your local Household Recycling Centre (HRC).

Disposable nappies

Choose reusable cloth nappies and reduce your nappy bill by £600 per baby! For further details about real nappies and how to save £30 from the cost of purchasing them, visit: dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/realnappies



Choose products with recyclable packaging where possible – or reuse as packing material.

Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE)


Donate safe unwanted items to a charity shop or list for reuse **www.freecycle.org** Check if broken items can be repaired, if not recycle at your nearest Household Recycling Centre (HRC).



Please use your food waste recycling container, or learn to "shop smarter".

- Buy only the food you need make a list and stick to it
- Eat all the food you buy correct storage will make it last longer
- Recycle the food that you can't eat –
 e.g. egg shells, fruit peelings

Mail

Reduce addressed junk mail by registering for the Mail Preference Service (MPS), visit:

Plastic bottles – all types with lids on

Reduce the number of drinks bottles you use.

Consider buying a reusable drinks container and refilling with tap water and other beverages instead of buying bottled drinks. See refill Dorset: litterfreecoastandsea.co.uk/refill-dorset

Cardboard boxes (flattened)

Try to choose products with less packaging. Torn up cardboard egg boxes and tubes can all be composted.

Try home composting; an inexpensive natural process that transforms your kitchen and garden waste into a valuable and nutrient rich food for your garden. For more information and to view the latest home composting offers, visit:

Egg shells

Can be composted or crushed and sprinkled around tender plants to deter slugs and snails.



All cooked and uncooked food including meat and fish

Store food correctly, make good use of your freezer and love your leftovers.

Remember, most fresh food can be frozen for use at a later date.



Tea bags and coffee grounds

Add to your home compost bin.



Composited

Please only use liners with the 'compostable' logo (left) or newspaper. No plastic bags please.



Glass jars (with metal lids on)

Reuse as storage for small items or try making your own jams and chutneys with any fruit and vegetables going past their best.

Cut flowers and plants

- Buy in bulk to reduce packaging and save money
- · Buy refills for bathroom products
- Avoid buying disposable items choose cloth napkins, rechargeable batteries and reusable razors
- · Repair items for reuse where possible
- Reuse paper and envelopes as scrap for shopping lists
- Start a junk box for craft making and to amuse children
