Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan Consultation Statement

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Prepared by the Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee on behalf of Shaftesbury Town Council - January 2020

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1. Introduction

The Neighbourhood Planning Regulations require that when a neighbourhood plan is submitted for examination a statement should also be submitted setting out the details of those consulted, how they were consulted, the main issues and concerns that people raised, and how these concerns and issues have been considered and where relevant addressed in the proposed plan. This document sets out the consultation carried out to inform the policies and objectives set out in Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan (Submission Version) and the how comments received during the Reg 14 consultation (Pre-Submission draft) have been addressed

The Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan has been a long time in preparation. Historically the Neighbourhood Plan area included the adjacent parishes of Melbury Abbas and Cann, however the plan for that area was never finalised, and the group responsible for preparing that plan was disbanded in July 2017, and separate Neighbourhood Plan areas were subsequently designated in November 2017. Much of the historic information was reviewed and where appropriate used in the Shaftesbury specific plan.

This consultation statement provides an overview of what has been carried out and how this has helped us to shape the content of the Shaftesbury specific Neighbourhood Plan from when work on this plan started in January 2018 through to the plan's submission in January 2020.

The Draft Neighbourhood Plan has been written by the Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee (SNPAC - a sub-committee of Shaftesbury Town Council), with the support from the Lead Councillor and Jo Witherden MRTPI of Dorset Planning Consultant Ltd (DPC) and facilitated by Brie Logan, the Business Manager at Shaftesbury Town Council. The language throughout the plan has been deliberately constructed to be user-friendly. Planning jargon has not been used and the reader experience has always been a priority. This can be evidenced in the numerous aspects of feedback that complement the team on the document's style and ease of use.

A chronological record of all the consultations and meetings held is provided in **Appendix 1**.

2. The formation of the Advisory committee

A public meeting was held on 23rd January 2018 to launch the start of the Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan and attract volunteers to help the Town Council with the process. The event was promoted on the Town Council's website (https://www.shaftesbury-tc.gov.uk/) and via a number of posters across the town. Over 40 residents joined the meeting and a presentation was given to the audience to outline the Neighbourhood Plan process. This forum also encouraged individuals to get involved and learn more via a selection of surgeries that were organised as a follow up to the event.



22 members of the public registered their interest in joining the Advisory Committee. To keep the committee a manageable size, it was deemed appropriate to recruit 12 people onto the committee. The selection process was based on the Locality skills assessment and Shaftesbury Town Council (STC) selected the individuals based on skills, capability and ability to engage with the wider Shaftesbury community.

Before submitting our plan proposal to the Local Planning Authority, we must bring it to the attention of people who live, work or carry business in the neighbourhood area.

WHAT IS REGULATION 14 CONSULTATION?

The Neighbourhood Plan Regulation 14 Consultation leaflet explains the details of the proposals for the Neighbourhood Plan, and where and when the draft policies may be reviewed. This questionnaire asks you to answer a question for each of the draft policies. Do you agree with each policy – yes or no? If you don't agree, then it would help the Neighbourhood Plan group to understand why you do not agree. The Neighbourhood Plan team will evaluate all of the responses from the Regulation 14 Consultation feedback and will work with the Dorset Planning Consultant to make amendments, where appropriate to do so.

- 4. Shaftesbury Melbury Abbas and Cann key issues identified from 2014 household survey
- 4a. Overview



The Shaftesbury Melbury Abbas and Cann questionnaire was distributed to every household in 2014.

The questionnaire featured 52 questions and 23 of those questions encouraged a free form response.

These free form responses were not analysed by the group until the Shaftesbury specific Neighbourhood Plan Advisory committee was formed in February 2018.

The group felt it is was critically important to take on board the entire viewpoint of the community.

The 5908 responses have since been collated and are represented in the document below.

One of the first tasks for the newly formed Advisory Group was to review and understand the key messages from the comprehensive survey undertaken by the previous Neighbourhood Plan group. Interim results had been produced and presented by the previous group https://www.shaftesburyplan.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2018/12/ShaftesburyNPGQuestionairre-Analysis-first-cut-June-2015-1.pdf, but the final report analysing the detailed comments had not been completed. A total of 5908 free form comments were captured. These comments were

analysed by the Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee in March 2018. These comments have been linked through to the relevant 5 themes.

Mini survey and responses (June 2018) – validating key themes 5.

Much work was undertaken by the Shaftesbury, Melbury Abbas and Cann Neighborhood Plan group. Dorset Planning Consultant Ltd (DPC), who had advised the previous working group, provided continuity between the groups as well as guidance in terms of policy development based on analysis of data and results of survey. However, mindful that three years had passed since the 2014 survey, the newly appointed Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee (SNPAC) agreed it important to test out the key themes with the community. Each Advisory Committee member committed to obtaining 10 completed surveys each from a cross-section of the community, and was provided with a guidance note in terms of how to conduct the survey to ensure consistency.

The results of the mini-survey helped to confirm what was a priority to local people, and also gathered some useful indicative evidence in terms of facilities used and travel patterns. In particular, it confirmed that people were concerned about the ability of infrastructure to cope, in terms of the

roads, traffic and parking, limitations of public transport, schools, health and social care. It also confirmed the perceived importance of the range of shops and availability of parking for the town centre.

6. Initial consultation (phase 1) February 2019 – draft policy intentions

Following much work researching the topic themes and issues for the Neighbourhood Plan, the Advisory Group developed policy a reas and ideas that they felt were appropriate for inclusion in the plan. These were presented to the Town Council at its meeting on 5 February 2019, in order for the Town Council to agree the policy aims and intentions in preparation for phase 1 public consultation.

This consultation ran for a two week period from 18 February 2019. The consultation was announced via a press release (dated 6 February) and included over 15 consultation events planned with a cross section of groups and organisations in the town, including locations such as the Town Hall, Library and Tesco. All of the related information was also published on the website and facebook page. The Local Greenspace landowner contact was made slightly later (in April) following the analysis of the initial results of the consultation.

6d. Example of letter sent to landowners re Local Green Space (LGS) designation

Dear x

We are contacting you to let you know that Rolt Millennium Green is being considered for Local Green Space designation through the Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan.

A Neighbourhood Plan provides a mechanism for protecting certain green spaces from future development. Some existing areas of green space are demonstrably special or have particular local significance, for example because of their historic links, recreational value, cultural significance, role in mitigating pollution or climate change, or richness of wildlife. Such spaces, that also meet the NPPF Paragraph 77 criteria, (they are not currently being considered for development, not extensive, and are close to the community they serve), can be designated as Local Green Spaces (LGS). Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Plan is hoping to designate Rolt Millennium Green as a Local Green Spaces for special protection.

Local communities can identify green spaces for special protection (where planning permission for new buildings would normally be refused other than in very special circumstances). In order to qualify for the Local Green Space designation, it is important that the green space:

- is in reasonably close proximity to the community it serves
- is demonstrably special to a local community and holds a particular local significance, for example because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquillity or richness of its wildlife
- is local in character and is not an extensive tract of land

Please be aware that land can be considered for designation even if there is no public access. Designation does not in itself confer any rights of public access over what exists at present or any specific requirements as to how the land is managed.

We would welcome any comments you may have on this proposal at this stage. We will take into account your response in the decision whether to include your site in the Neighbourhood Plan. The independent Examiner for the Neighbourhood Plan will also consider whether the designation is appropriate before the Plan is finalised.

I have attached a map to show the Local Green Space pertaining to Rolt Millennium Green.

There were 2 questions where a high percentage of respondents disagreed with the policies we had suggested, and therefore resulted in a change to the approach proposed for the Neighbourhood Plan.

Firstly, even though many people agreed with the option to accept small scale affordable housing developments outside of the settlement boundary (which could mean building on green fields) over 60% of responses indicated no support for this policy. As a result of this consultation feedback the decision was made to not include rural exception site policy (which would have deviated from the approach taken in the Local Plan).

Another of our proposing policies suggested encouraging the addition of upper floors to buildings in the town centre (where appropriate) which could create additional residential accommodation in the form of flats above the shops. Whilst nearly 60% of people either agreed or were uncertain, there were still a significant amount of responses that did not support this policy intention. Given that the inclusion of the policy could be divisive in terms of the referendum, the decision was taken to omit it from the plan.

The detailed comments were also considered and guided further refinements to the policy drafting.

7. Pre-submission draft consultation 1st August – 26th September 2019

The final consultation stage (sometimes known as the Regulation 14 consultation) was on the pre-submission draft. The draft plan was presented to the Planning and Highways meeting of the Town Council on Tuesday 21st May following on from an informal SNPAC/ Councillor briefing session. The

Town Council resolved to adopt the Draft Neighbourhood Plan policies and projects in readiness of the formal public consultation that was anticipated as starting in July 2019.

Due to staff illness, the start of the consultation was slightly delayed, and started on the 1st August, running for an extended period of 9 weeks (to close on 26th September). The draft plan was available for review online throughout the consultation period via the dedicated Shaftesbury Neighbourhood Pan website together with a questionnaire/ feedback form, and emails sent to the statutory consultees. A consultation leaflet (explaining how to complete the questionnaires) was also delivered to every address within the parish boundary in mid August. A number of pop-up events were also scheduled.

The Arts Centre (awaiting confirmation), Town Hall and Library acting as Neighbourhood Plan hubs, where a hard copy of the plan was available for the public to review alongside paper copies of the questionnaires to



complete. Hard copies were also made available to each of the community groups such as the Civic Society, OSG, Chamber, British Legion etc.... to circulate over the 9 weeks to their members.

7a. Consultation information leaflet -

Every household in the Shaftesbury parish received an information leaflet via Royal Mail on 16th August 2019. The information leaflet explains 'what is the Neighborhood Plan'? an outline of each of the policies and an overview of how the Neighbourhood plan was developed. 7c. The pop-up shop and community hubs engagement process

The pop-up shop was in operation for 15 days over the course of the consultation period – 1st August to 26th September 2019. Further pop up events took place at Tesco and the Library. In total 18 pop-up events took place throughout August and September 2019.

The one over-arching issue was whether the plan has done enough in terms of climate change...

1.10 Climate change

Main Issues identified:

No overriding policy to address the present global emergency

Suggested response:

The idea of a climate change policy had been considered in drafting the plan – but climate change touches on so many different areas, that a single policy was not considered practical. The decision was therefore taken to include climate change in the introduction and show how the plan was addressing the issues and challenges throughout its policies.

We have taken this opportunity to look again at the policies **and wherever possible reinforce the importance of addressing climate change** – however it is clear from the Bridport NP Examiner's report that setting requirements that go beyond existing Government standards is not possible. Updates have also been made to the introduction to reinforce some of the key messages and to reflect the changes to the plan

3. Housing and Employment

SFHE1: tries to limit further development outside settlement boundary (in the context of the wider housing shortfall) SFHE2: sets out general principles for the delivery and phasing of sites in light of problems experienced in large scale schemes SFHE3: identifies and protects employment land to ensure it remains available as the population grows SFHE4: confirms the local importance of safeguarding the bypass corridor

Main Issues identified:

Number of comments relating to the need to strengthen the protection given to the settlement boundary (also developers suggesting the opposite)

Lack of conviction that phasing issues would be resolved and monitoring will take place

Suggest more detail on housing types required

Explain more clearly what the land will be safeguarded for (presumably for employment purposes). Some areas gueried on map

Number of comments relating to whether the bypass is necessary / impact on homes along that route

Suggested response:

SFHE1 and supporting text amended to provide greater clarity on the amount of housing already provided / proposed and the importance of any future growth being considered strategically - but we cannot "say no" whilst the Local Plan policies on housing are not up to date.

More examples included to provide guidance on issues that should be considered (including highway adoption mechanisms) and S106 funding for monitoring

SFHE2 amended to include dwelling types likely to be suitable for: older people; and those working from home

- Supporting text to clarify following Local Plan approach which considered non-B class uses plus nursing homes (but not on main employment sites). Maps checked and updated (including treatment of areas outside the parish)
- No change clear support from majority and evidenced by traffic counts.

SFGI1: protects the important and locally valued green spaces SFGI2: protects the slopes and the key views from inappropriate development that would spoil their enjoyment SFGI3: includes general guidance on landscape character and provision of new green infrastructure SFGI4: seeks to conserve and enhance the quality of the dark night skies

Main Issues identified:

Queries on a number of spaces raised eg: status of the Wilderness, spaces on the Persimmon Master Plan, school playing fields, Littledown planned space, eastern corridor SUDS amenity area

Question the basis for identifying the Slopes and Important Views

Various suggestions re management of trees and green spaces, landscape character and climate change

Suggested response:

4. Green Infrastructure

All spaces suggested re-checked against criteria – main change: deletion of SUDS amenity area as this should not be an impediment to the delivery of the bypass. List and map updated as appropriate. NB future POS cannot be LGS until it exists, but is now shown

- Explanation of methodology to be included in the plan Minor amendment to SFGI2 to clarify that the views are not limited to the hilltop. Improved view descriptions

Supporting text and projects strengthened – including reference to strategic tree planting within the town centre and community renewable energy (eg co-operative)

5. Design and Heritage

SFDH1-7: design guidance based on local character and experiences

SFDH8: highlights the importance of investigating Shaftesbury's subterranean archaeology when development is planned SFDH9: identifies locally important historic buildings to ensure their contribution is recognized in planning decisions

Main Issues identified:

Varied response to locally important historic buildings status from landowners (support and objecting)

Concerns about whether this is "too late" – eg changes to plastic windows through permitted development

Beef up climate change issues – energy efficiency requirements etc

Suggested response:

Remove designations where owners have raised strong objections



New project: work with Dorset Council to investigate whether an Article 4 direction would be appropriate

Add in reference to aspects already in place eg biodiversity mitigation, proposed changes Building Regulations etc. Amend SFDH2 to encourage developers to exceed the target emission rates of the current Building Regulations (as per Bridport examiner's recommendations). Reference wind impacts.

NB various minor points on clarity raised and corrected as appropriate eg dates, Shaftesbury Sandstone (not Greensand) etc

Following the receipt of objections from landowners additional properties have been removed from the list of locally important buildings



6. Community and Leisure

SFCL1: protecting and enhancing community facilities SFCL2: supporting sustainable tourism SFCL3: improving and extending the existing footpath and cycle path network

Main Issues identified:

Concerns that the funds for community facilities in the eastern development would be diverted to improving existing halls

Lots of reference to development of walking and cycling routes

Concerns raised about sports and leisure provision

Suggested response:

This was not being proposed (Project CL1) – provide further clarity on funding and future consultation on provision in that part of the town

Further liaison undertaken with Dorset Council and the main user group – inclusion of Dorset Council Local Route proposals and new project CL6 re: develop and improve cycleways to extend the network to the hinterland and countryside

Include project to develop a clearer list of sport and leisure facility requirements to prioritise S106 funding
