# **LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK** Shaping the future of North Dorset

## Report on the Core Strategy Focus Group Meetings, July 2005

15th August 2005



During July a series of five Focus Group meetings, each concentrating on a specific topic of relevance to the Core Strategy, were held within the District. The aim of these meetings was for the NDDC Planning Policy team to facilitate the evening only, allowing the attendees (members of the public, stakeholders and professionals) to identify issues that they considered are currently relevant in the District and those issues which are likely to be relevant in the longer term.

Five focus groups were held on five evenings in July; Environment – 7<sup>th</sup> July, NDDC Council Offices, Nordon, Blandford Living – 12<sup>th</sup> July, NDDC Council Offices, Nordon, Blandford Travelling – 14<sup>th</sup> July, NDDC Council Offices, Nordon, Blandford Housing – 21<sup>st</sup> July, Gillingham Town Council Offices, Gillingham Economy – 25<sup>th</sup> July, Gillingham Town Council Offices, Gillingham

At each Focus Group a brief introduction to the new planning process and the purpose of the Core Strategy was given

The Focus Groups were organised to allow everyone that attended to voice their own concerns, issues and visions for the District, and then for these to be discussed in small groups of between 3-5 people (depending on the number of people attending). It was then the Planning Officer's task to facilitate the grouping of these issues, with consent from the group as a whole, and later to assist in the naming of the titles of the overarching issues.

The outcomes of all five evenings are displayed in the tables below.

The evenings concluded with an explanation of what would happen next in the development of the Core Strategy, and feedback sheets were handed out. The information gathered was fed into a special meeting of North Dorset's Planning Policy Panel on the  $27^{th}$  July at which a first draft of aims and objectives for the Core Strategy was discussed. #### <u>Outcomes</u>

A large and highly diverse range of key issues were produced in all of the Focus Groups, ranging from Renewable Energy to Waste Management in the Environment Focus Group to Barriers to Business and Quality Tourism in the Economy Focus Group.

The issues that had been formulated in the Community Plans process were very similar to those that were produced in the Focus Groups. In the tables below these community plan issues are highlighted in red.
