
A letter from Robert Honeyburn, a Soldier in India, to his family in Longbredy.

Honored Father and Mother,

Journal Journal Journal be wather swipinged at receiving a Letter from a Person, whom I imagine you thought long since dead, however this comes with my dutiful respects to you both also my Brotherly love to all my Brothers and disters, hoping it will find you all in a perfect state of health and happiness. As for myself. I am very well in health and in as good circumstances as a Private Soldier can wish. I also have the happiness to belong to very Honorable borps. which is the Bengal Addlery but have been the great fatigues within these Six years past on account of the war.

Brothers. \_ after my leaving Bengal. we sailed for boa a Portugusu Settlement on the estalabar boast, and on the news of Deace between France and England my bompany left that place, and sailed for the Ringdom of Juryerat where we landed, and joined a Wetachment that was under orders to march to the Borders of that bountry to quell a Rebellion there after storming and carry=
ing the Enemies works and Lines we completed the Victoryafter which, we marched for Swrat a very large Bity to the Monthward of Bombey of at which place we remained some months and in betober 1802. we left Swrat for Bombay on furpose of returning to Bengal but have been detained here sine
