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LOCAL NEED AREA - ST LEONARDS & ST IVES

1.0 DESCRIPTION OF AREA - St.LEONARDS AND ST IVES

The Parish of St. Leonards and St. Ives lies on a low ridge of heathy and wooded land between the Moors River in the west and the River Avon in the east. Here the Avon forms the County boundary with Hampshire. The A31 Trunk Road crosses the ridge in a north-east to south-west direction running from Ringwood towards Ferndown, Poole and western Dorset.

There are two separate built-up areas in the parish, both of which are overall of a low density and well-treed. St. Leonards and St. Ives itself lies to the north of the Trunk Road. The second settlement is Avon Castle, lying on the narrow belt of high ground between the A338 Spur Road to Bournemouth and the River Avon.

Both settlements have a high proportion of retired people in their populations. There are a very few local shops: otherwise the area depends on outside centres. St. Leonards and St. Ives have a good, modern village hall, with a recreation ground including children's play, tennis and bowls facilities, and a separate recreation ground on the Horton Road. Otherwise formal recreation facilities are lacking. The settlement has a County First School but no library and there is a small industrial estate adjoining the western border.

The remainder of the Parish is rural, with a scatter of development, particularly at the Grange Estate, where rural resettlement was undertaken after the First World War. Also to the south of the A31 and west of the A338 are the Avon Heath Country Park, Matchams Park and stadium, and the Barnsfield Heath and Hurn military testing grounds. Matchams is a motor sport centre of national standing.

The Local Plan states that although existing provision is limited, additional sports fields are unlikely to be necessary, particularly because of the unusually large proportion of older people in the parish. If needs arise for additional sports fields for adult use, these could be provided in the Green Belt, subject to the other policies and proposals of the Plan.

It is expected that the Moors Valley and Avon Heath Country Parks will continue to act as major local facilities for informal countryside recreation. Further improvements to the access to both parks may be desirable, although the nature conservation importance of the Avon Heath must be protected.

2.0 SUMMARY OF PROVISION AND QUALITY OF OPEN SPACE

2.1 Open Space within St.Leonards & St.Ives

2.2 Quality of sites in St.Leonards & St.lves

In the following lists 'n/s' means 'Not scored'.

2.2.1 Active Sports Space

There are no significant quality issues with the sport spaces within St.Leonards & St.Ives. Both facilities are in good condition and priority should be made to ensure the quality is maintained.

2.2.2 Space for Children and Young People

The Braeside Road recreation ground play area is the only children & young people's facility identified in the area. The general quality is average, maintenance and management should be improved on the site.

In general, the management and maintenance of amenity green spaces across the area was fairly good. A number of sites offer opportunity for improvement, upgrading the general maintenance is required on the following sites;

- Bushmead Drive (60%)
- Glenives Close (60%)
- Fernlea Close (60%)

In general, the management and maintenance of Natural & Semi Natural Green Space across St.Leonards & St.Ives were found to be in good condition. A number

of sites offer opportunity for improvement, however, the gap scores are not significant in any of the cases, and it is more a case of improving 'attention to detail'. Leybrook common woodland is in need of particular attention.

2.2.5 Recreation Grounds and Public Gardens

Braeside Road and Horton Recreation Grounds provide the formal parks in the area, both parks are in reasonable condition but have some quality issues. Both are well used and require upgrading to improve user satisfaction.

The only school is St Ives County First School with playing fields and a MUGA. This was not quality assessed.

3.0 SUMMARY OF ACCESSIBILITY TO OPEN SPACE

3.1 Overall access to open space

Section 5 of the report outlines access standards to different types of open space within the Local Need Area, a summary of the main standards is shown in Table 2:

4.0 FINDINGS FROM SURVEY AND CONSULTATION

Citizen's Panel

29 people living in St Leonards & St Ives parish responded to the Citizen's Panel Survey; for analysis, placed in Northern Sub Area (103 in total). People living in the Northern Sub Area are more frequent (compared to the district as a whole) visitors to local recreation grounds, recreation cyclepaths, spaces to enjoy nature and wildlife and sports centres and community halls, and less frequent visitors to swimming pools and health and fitness centres

The types of open space respondents would like to see more of in the Northern Sub Area are spaces to enjoy nature and wildlife and spaces for teenagers. The most important attributes of open space are that they should be easy to get to, safe and secure, with a range of facilities. The most important facilities to have in nearby open space areas are: toilets, dog bins and seats.

Two thirds of respondents would like to use open spaces near them more often: more information and if facilities and open space areas were perceived to be safer would be important in encouraging this.

Local Areas of Open Space in St Leonards & St Ives

Residents from St Leonards & St Ives most commonly visited Moors Valley and Avon Heath Country Parks and the Castleman Trailway. Other areas outside the district mentioned included the New Forest and Sandbanks beach. The main reasons for visiting these areas are to go for a walk, to cycle, to walk the dog and to visit areas of nature interest and value.

Other comments made highlighted:

- The council do not appear to be taking care of our open space top of Spinney Close - as they used to be e.g. mowing - it is very heavily used - could this be improved? (St Leonards).
- Free parking would be very nice in e.g. Birch Rd, Boundary Lane car parks, Castleman. Better signposting e.g. re Trailway + car parking areas on e.g. Horton Road, Lions Hill.....
- Moors Valley is an excellent example of open spaces for all the family and earns the respect of the users judging by the use of cleanliness, lack of damage and of noise.
- St Ives Village park could be improved with a better variety of play equipment, e.g. climbing frames, swings and more tennis courts.
- The countryside is too special to be swamped by "townees" and made inaccessible to local people by vested interests e.g. RSPB.

Summary of Provision

There are two main sports sites in this LNA:

- Braeside Road Recreation ground is the main site an informal grassed recreation ground with one permanent 5-aside goal, a bowls green, 4 tarmac tennis courts:
- Horton Road Recreation Ground: Informal recreation ground with single full size football pitch: Grange FC

There is a cricket field and poorly maintained tennis court at St Leonard's Hospital, which lies outside the LNA to the south west.

There is a large area of heathland provision, containing Avon Heath Country Park and Matcham's Stadium.

St Leonards and St Ives Parish Council

The parish council states that there are poor quality pitches and poor quality children's play areas – needs refurbishment. Older children are not well catered for. The Parish Council has a plan to refurbish the Braeside play area which will give more for older children but funding is required. Braeside Road village hall has some spare capacity. The most used open space in the parish is Braeside Road hall and recreation ground.


Scope for increasing use of school facilities – possibility of increasing public access to St Ives First school swimming pool with investment

The Parish Council maintains Braeside Road recreation ground and play area, Horton Road village green and 7 aside pitch and Jubilee copse, Ashley Drive South

5.0 QUANTITY OF OPEN SPACE

5.1 Quantity standards for open space

Section 5 of the report outlines the quantity standards for open space within the District; a summary of these draft <u>minimum</u> standards is shown below:



5.2 Quantities of different types of open space

These standards have been applied at a local level to determine the provision of different types of open space across the adopted minimum standard, this is summarised in table 4 which shows:

- the existing quantity of open space (existing provision);
- the required quantity of open space for the population of the area (required provision);
- the surplus or deficiency of open space (in m² and acres);
- Supply against the standard.

5.3 Key Points: Quantitative Provision of Open Space in St Leonards and St lyes

St Leonards & St Ives LNA is underprovided for in quantitative terms by all open space typologies other than natural and semi natural greenspace; it is one of the three most underprovided for LNAs (the others being Colehill and Wimborne).

6.0 ISSUES ARISING IN ST LEONARDS AND ST IVES

- St Leonards & St Ives has two well placed recreation grounds to serve the main heart of the settlement, These two recreation sites host all sports facilities and play areas, so are key to making the most of the opportunities available. There are small pockets of amenity open space dotted about.
- However, because of the low level of provision of formal sport (only one full size football pitch) and one children's play area, it is underprovided for in relation to the proposed quantitative standards of provision. Formal pitch provision seems adequate at the moment based on current demand, but because of the considerable shortfall, this situation should be kept under review.
- The presence of Avon Heath gives the highest level of provision of natural green space of any of the East Dorset LNAs.
- Avon Castle is outside all the catchment areas; it has no open space, other than heathland outcrops.
- Leybrook common woodland is in need of particular attention.

- Braeside Road and Horton recreation grounds are in reasonable condition but have some quality issues. Both are well used and require upgrading to improve user satisfaction.
- There is a parish proposal to upgrade Braeside play area.
- Only one children's play area and no facilities for teenagers facilities for young people and children should thus be a priority, despite the demographic profile.
 The First school is in an opportune location and possibilities for improving facilities there for community use should be investigated.
- Across the District, provision of allotments is low and many LNAs have no allotment sites. As set out in Section 5, this Report recommends a new look at the burgeoning interest in allotment gardening, and how new sites can be brought into use to cater for growing demand.
