Preparing a local nature recovery strategy is a collective process involving a wide range of local people and organisations to create a shared vision for nature recovery. A strategy that is reflective of local people's views is key to bringing together focused action to restore, grow and connect nature across Dorset.

This consultation and engagement report outlines how we communicated with stakeholders, including the public, during the preparation of Dorset's local nature recovery strategy to give everyone the chance to contribute to the 10-year vision for nature's recovery in Dorset.

Background

Protecting and recovering nature to increase wildlife and habitats is a priority for Dorset as it supports the government's target to manage and protect 30 per cent of land, rivers and seas for nature by 2030 (commonly known as the '30by30 target'). Increasing wildlife in Dorset and expanding and connecting Dorset's important habitats will bring big benefits to both people and wildlife. Doing this in a coordinated way will mean that everyone can play a part in how we achieve this target and add value so that the whole is greater than the sum of its parts.

Each county across England is preparing a local nature recovery strategy, which will be combined to help create a national nature recovery network. If successful this will have a significant outcome, with new wildlife corridors formed, new partnerships developed, and large landscape scale nature recovery projects delivered. This should also build a wider understanding of nature recovery, how people connect with and benefit from nature, and how collective action can really make a difference.

Dorset Council was appointed by Defra to lead on the preparation of the Dorset Local Nature Recovery Strategy, working closely with BCP Council and Natural England who were appointed as supporting authorities.



Objectives

To enable effective communication and engagement, a multi-sector local nature recovery strategy communications and engagement advisory group created a communications and engagement plan with 6 key objectives.



- 1. **Improve understanding** of what nature recovery is, what the 30 by 30 target is, and why nature recovery is needed.
- 2. Ensure key stakeholders are kept informed and updated on progress throughout the development of the local nature recovery strategy
- 3. **Encourage target audiences** to input into the development of Dorset's local nature recovery strategy through early engagement activities and formal consultation.
- 4. **Encourage a shared vision** for nature recovery in Dorset to inspire action amongst residents, partners and organisations.
- 5. Achieve a **shared consensus** amongst target audiences of how success for nature recovery will be measured in Dorset.
- 6. **Support** the communication actions set out within the Dorset Council Natural Environment, Climate and Ecology Strategy and BCP Council Climate and Ecological Emergency Action Plan.

All communications and engagement were to be accessible, using clear communication with no jargon, real-life examples, and timely deliverance to a wide, varied audience through different mediums.

Deliverables, implementation channels and evaluation metrics were identified amongst partners, and an activity timeline created. The timeline below summarises the communications and engagement activities completed whilst Dorset's local nature recovery strategy has been prepared.





Summer to Autumn 2023: Making connections

Meeting people and groups who are already taking action to recover nature, stakeholder analysis and formation of the Dorset local nature recovery strategy steering group and advisory groups. Communications and engagement plan created.

Spring 2024: Nature Recovery Dorset

Nature Recovery Dorset branding created and added to the Dorset Council website.

#LeapIntoNature social media campaign encouraging others to share their nature recovery actions.

Nature recovery messaging embedded in the redesigned Love your verge campaign.

Summer to Autumn 2024: Wider engagement

Raising awareness of Nature Recovery Dorset and Dorset's local nature recovery strategy with key audiences through wider engagement at 3 agricultural shows, Planet Purbeck nature and wellbeing fair and a co-hosted nature and sustainable farming tour and workshop and 2 youth workshops.

Autumn 2024: Preparing the draft strategy

Two public webinars informed and updated a wider audience on the strategy and work so far with time for feedback and questions.

Advisory groups refining the draft written elements and mapping.

June 2023

Dorset Council announced as the Responsible Authority for Dorset's local nature recovery strategy. Webpages published on the Dorset Council website and linked from the BCP Council website.

Autumn 2023 to Spring 2024: Spreading the word and gathering inputs

Attending and holding events to raise awareness of the local nature recovery strategy, progress so far and our plan for preparing Dorset's strategy. Feedback and inputs into the strategy were gathered through workshops and answering questions.

Following feedback, the Dorset farmer clusters advisory group was formed.

May 2024: All groups together

All the advisory groups attended a workshop to feedback on and refine the work each group had been producing, plus workshops to give the groups direction on their next tasks.

August 2024: Celebrating and supporting nature recovery in Dorset Launch of the Nature Recovery Dorset network and the first Sustainable Business network award winners receive their awards.

Call for submissions to be included in the high opportunity nature areas.

Winter 2024/25 – Consultation on the preconsultation draft strategy with Dorset Council, BCP Council and Natural England

Who we engaged

Identifying stakeholders

A stakeholder analysis was carried out and six categories were identified as being key in the preparation of Dorset's local nature recovery strategy. Identifying these categories helped us define our internal and external audiences and form advisory groups to help prepare the strategy.



Advisory groups

A steering group and 5 advisory groups were set up with **76 representatives from 42 different organisations** across the 6 stakeholder categories. Together, the group members gave over **1,300 hours** towards preparing Dorset's local nature recovery strategy.





Each group was set a brief and met approximately every 6 weeks, attended all groups workshops, as well as worked on focused tasks outside of meetings that shaped the strategy. Some of these tasks involved members gathering more inputs from wider stakeholders within their networks.

This was our first engagement event with this key stakeholder group outside of our advisory groups to inform them what the LNRS is and what it isn't, how it is being prepared in Dorset, collect inputs on key questions and hear their questions and feedback.

A short presentation was given on the progress of Dorset's local nature recovery strategy since the event on 13 February and the upcoming opportunity to be included in the High Opportunity Nature Areas. A workshop gathered further input on the draft priorities and activities.

Links to register were distributed internally and externally through our partners including Farming in Protected Landscapes (FiPL) and advertised from our website.

Each webinar covered what the local nature recovery strategy is, how it is being prepared in Dorset, the draft priorities as well as encouraging people to include their land in the high opportunity nature areas and join the Nature Recovery Dorset network. There was also time for questions and answers.

Nature Recovery Dorset

Nature Recovery Dorset is a movement to restore, enhance and connect spaces for nature in our county. Nature Recovery Dorset and the Nature Recovery Dorset network support the development and delivery of Dorset's local nature recovery .

Resources

Branding was created that features on the webpage, presentations, digital resources and physical resources that helps gives Nature Recovery Dorset its own identity. Banners, leaflets and factsheets were made for our wider engagement in Summer 2024 that enabled us to have stalls at events, easily distribute key information and attract new audiences interested in nature recovery to engage with us.

Nature Recovery Dorset network

Individuals, farmers, landowners, communities and organisation who are helping restore nature in Dorset are encouraged to join the Nature Recovery Dorset network.

The network is free to join and by joining members will:

- help show where spaces for nature are being created or enhanced
- · connect with others working to expand and connect nature in the county
- · get access to free resources to showcase and promote nature projects
- have the opportunity to share success, exchange ideas and inspire others

Since the network's launch in August 2024, the Nature Recovery Dorset network has **231 members** all making space for nature across the county. As part of launching the Nature Recovery Dorset network, we teamed up with Litter Free Dorset to add a nature recovery category to their sustainable business award.

We also partnered with Dorset Wildlife Trust as they updated their website to offer a self-help hub of resources and case studies to help communities and individuals be part of nature's recovery in Dorset. Between September 2024 to January 2025, some of these webpages have had 180 views.

Dorset local nature recovery strategy webpages

A specific area on the Dorset Council website was created and provided information on the local nature recovery strategy process, the different groups and timeline, as well as other key information. As preparing the strategy progressed and the Nature Recovery Dorset branding was created, the local nature recovery strategy webpages evolved.

Specific pages were added to provide detailed information specifically for farmers, landowners and land managers. The content of this page was derived from questions received at the making Dorset local nature recovery strategy works for farm businesses event. The page has developed over time providing more opportunities to get involved.

Website metrics

The total numbers of webpage views were **3,147** between June and November 2024. The table below shows the number of views the 10 webpages with the most views received from users that accepted site cookies. The numbers of views are likely to be double these figures.


Surveys

The tell us about your nature recovery project survey was sent to existing or proposed large projects in November 2023. The survey was sent to known projects both in Dorset and cross-border to have a clear understanding of what is happening locally and how success might be measured to help us consider how the Dorset's local nature recovery strategy will celebrate and align with existing work.

In August 2024 we asked farmers, landowners and land managers to put land forward to be included in the high opportunity nature areas. This survey was distributed widely to attendees of the making Dorset local nature recovery strategy work for farm businesses event, the Dorset farmer clusters advisory group, large estates in Dorset and organisations who own or manage land in Dorset. Partners such as FiPL, the NFU and CLA also distributed this opportunity to their Dorset networks. Taking into account what land managers are already doing or considering doing helped us to propose opportunities for nature recovery that are more likely to be delivered.







Press releases, social media, e-newsletters and radio

Press releases, social media and e-newsletters were used to raise awareness of the nature recovery vision for Dorset, what the Dorset local nature recovery strategy is and how to get involved to wide and diverse audiences.

Social media

How we responded to feedback and

lessons learnt

The wide range of feedback received has been invaluable in creating a collective local nature recovery strategy. At the making Dorset local nature recovery strategy work for farm businesses event in February 2024, farmers, landowners and land managers told us that they wanted more farmer voices to be heard if the strategy will be used widely. Following this, we created the Dorset farmer clusters advisory group who have offered important insight and input to the strategy, especially on the farming pressures and opportunities and, priorities and activities. We also created a Q&A document in response to questions raised by farmers at the event, which was later adapted to create a webpage of further information for farmers and landowners.

Through the group's recommendation to attend agricultural shows and being able to co-host the farm tour and workshop with Dougal and George Hosford, we have further engaged with the farming sector who play a pivotal role in nature recovery. It has therefore been great to see farmers, landowners and land managers put forward their land as high opportunity nature areas and joined the Nature Recovery Dorset Network.

Preparing Dorset's local nature recovery strategy has been an iterative process. The advisory groups completing set tasks together and refining their work using inputs helped ensure the strategy is collective and represents the views of many different people. Although each group had a set brief they didn't work in isolation and the groups were great at providing different perspectives on the same tasks or providing feedback on another group's work and ideas that allowed for continual improvement. Each group regularly gave updates at the local nature recovery strategy steering group meetings, and all group workshops, and meetings spread throughout the strategy preparation process provided key points for the groups to come together and progress their work.


The variety of stakeholders on the advisory groups and engaged through workshops helped emphasise the importance of the language we use. There is a vast amount of terminology around nature and the environment and people sharing what different terms and words mean to them has been helped create a strategy that communicates that everyone can play a role in making more space for nature in Dorset.

How we drafted the 12 nature recovery priorities








How people in Dorset are making space for nature
