Dinah's Hollow Slope Stabilisation Scheme

New project, but previous EqIA has been completed in 2020. The project has been ongoing since 2014.

4. Please provide a brief overview of its aims and objectives:

The slopes in Dinah's Hollow were identified at risk for landslide.

The aim of the project is to stabilise the slopes in order to prevent severe injury or loss of life to road users. Provide safer highway.

5. Please provide the background to this proposal?

July 2012 – A landslip at Beaminster Tunnel overwhelmed the head wall depositing a large quantity of soil on to the highway. The tragedy engulfed a car and killed 2 people. Dorset Highways were prompted to examine other slopes perceived to be at high risk of failure.

Brody Forbes, local geotechnical consultant, placed Dinah's Hollow on high-risk alert. This assessment was confirmed by national consultant Parsons Brinckerhoff (now WSP). Slope analysis calculations demonstrated the possibility of burying a small vehicle.

April 2014 – Dinah's hollow was closed to traffic removing all risk and eliminating the only practical alternative route to the A350 running north-south through Dorset. The geotechnical consultant designed a soil nailing solution similar to Beaminster Tunnel for full mitigation of the risk.

9 March 2016 approximately 35 tonnes of soil slipped from the east bank into the hollow and displaced the concrete barriers closing the road.

Since then, minor landslips have occurred without disruption to traffic due to the installation of temporary concrete barriers.

In 2020 and 2021, Cabinet approved respectively, the scheme and funding. Negotiations to acquire the land in order to deliver the scheme restarted in 2021. They have been ongoing since.

In 2024, Cabinet approved funding increase and CPO if necessary to acquire the land.

6. What sources of data, evidence or research has been used for this assessment? (e.g national statistics, employee data):

Not Applicable- This is a safety scheme. Relevant geotechnical studies and reports have been produced (see point 5).

The Project is necessary in order to provide safer highway for all users.

Discussion have been ongoing since 2014 with specialist geotechnical consultants, officers, senior management, Cllrs.
